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C1-3

C1 The word to Nineveh (Assyrians). The first chapter provides descriptive terms of God almighty. This typically happens when God is compared to a n entity or nation who claims to be all powerful. God takes vengeance on those who oppose him.

The prophet juxtaposes God's anger and fury with God's love (7). The Assyrians have control on God's people, but the prophet' sword is that it will be broken (13).

Here is the reality of anything that Has God's person or child, only God can deliver us from bondage.

C2 Throughout the prophets, it's clear they have words for every nation. The same nation that destroyed Judah (Babylon), is on its way to destroy the Assyrians (2). Those of Nineveh would be exiled according to the prophecy (7-8). Never again would they rise to conquer any nation (13).
